Sequestration

Budget Control Act of 2011:

- Imposes binding caps on spending for defense and non-defense discretionary programs in FY 2012-2021.
 Together with spending reductions enacted in FY 2011, these caps will reduce discretionary spending by \$1.5 trillion over ten years
- Requires across-the-board cut (sequestration) of non-exempt discretionary and mandatory programs, beginning on January 2, 2013. Also further reduces spending caps in FY 2014-2021

OVERVIEW


- 1. Congress has already enacted deep cuts in housing assistance and other essential resources for low-income families and communities and these cuts will continue to deepen in coming years under the Budget Control Act.
- Under sequestration in 2013, hundreds of thousands of low-income families would lose rental assistance, and communities would lose \$3.5 billion in HUD/USDA housing and community development funding.
- 3. To protect vulnerable low-income families and communities from further cuts, sequestration should be cancelled and replaced only with a balanced package to reduce projected deficits through mandatory savings and significant revenue increases.

Change in Funding, 2010 – 2012, in millions of nominal dollars



Impact of Sequestration in 2013


- \$1.5 billion cut from Section 8 vouchers; as many as ~180,000 families could lose vouchers in 2013
- •\$772 million cut from Section 8 Project-Based Assistance
- \$325 million cut from public housing operations; capital funds would be cut by \$154 million
- •\$241 million cut from CDBG formula grants
- \$156 million cut from homeless assistance
- •\$82 million cut from HOME

How to Get Several Trillion \$ in Additional Deficit Reduction

- If Social Security, Medicare, and defense are largely protected...
- And there is little or no new revenue...
- Then there are only two major parts of the budget left to target:
 - 1) the entitlement safety net for low-income households; and
 - 2) Nondefense discretionary programs, including employment and training, education, Head Start, WIC, lowincome housing and community development, research, infrastructure etc.
- *Revenues are key:* without them, nondefense discretionary programs and anti-poverty programs will face massive cuts.





Principles for Deficit Reduction

- 1. Low-income families and individuals should not be made worse off by deficit reduction actions, e.g., by experiencing increased housing cost burdens.
- 2. Sequestration should be cancelled and replaced with a balanced package of responsible mandatory savings and significant revenue increases.
- 3. Any additional deficit reduction must take into account the already enacted \$1.5 trillion in discretionary spending cuts. Funding for non-defense discretionary programs should not be cut below the level adopted under the BCA spending cap.
- 4. Deficit reduction efforts that include inflexible spending mechanisms such as spending or revenue caps should be opposed because they are likely to result in additional deep cuts to housing and community development programs.
- 5. Tax provisions that facilitate community development investments and expand the availability of affordable housing for low income households should be
 protected in any future deficit reduction or tax reform package.




