# The Disaster Housing Recovery Coalition (DHRC)



- Coordinated by the National Low Income Housing Coalition
- Composed of over 800 local, state and national organizations, many directly working on the ground in post-disaster areas
- Working to ensure federal disaster recovery efforts reach all impacted households, including those that have the fewest resources to recover
- The Puerto Rico Working Group was created after Hurricane Maria struck the island in late 2017

## Hurricane Maria: The Damage & Response



#### **Destruction – By the Numbers:**

- Over 3,000 killed
- Over <u>300,000 homes</u> damaged by wind or flooding
- Over \$90 billion in damage to Puerto Rico and the USVI

Inequality and Poverty Made Worse by the Storm

#### Before Hurricane Maria:


- 45% of the Territory's population lived in poverty – more than <u>triple</u> the national average.
- 3 out of 4 of the lowest income families paid more than 30% of their income on housing
- More than 110,000 homes lacked basic kitchens and plumbing

FEMA Denied Assistance to Puerto Ricans at Twice the Rate of Other Survivors

- FEMA denied nearly two thirds of the nearly 1.2 million applications for FEMA assistance filed in Puerto Rico twice the denial rate after Hurricane Harvey
- At least 77,000 of these households were denied assistance because FEMA failed to recognize local land ownership practices and the island's informal housing system.
