

Rise in Punitive Proposals Following Grants Pass v. Johnson Decision



Star-C's Eviction Relief Fund



- Helps keep families in their homes and prevents eviction-related transiency/turnover in the local schools
- Has included motel to home program
- Hardship requirements are based on funding entity



- Covers 14 county area in Metro Atlanta Region (per funding)
- Started with \$50,000 GoFundMe; Raised \$16.5 million to date
- 330+ Metro Atlanta landlords with 62,500+ units registered



- Partnerships with Cobb and Fulton Magistrate Courts
- Funding partners: Cobb County, City of Atlanta, United Way of Greater Atlanta, Community Foundation for Greater Atlanta, DeKalb County, Private Foundations, Individual Donors



City of Atlanta Eviction Diversion Program

- \$4 million in funding for rental/eviction diversion assistance
- City of Atlanta renters with household income up to 60% of AMI
- Assistance capped at \$7,000
- Prioritizes 3 key demographics, but will serve all rental households under 60% AMI:

A Nationally Recognized Supportive Housing Solution







Flexible Housing Subsidy Pool





Flexible tool to house people in various housing settings



Launched in 2014 by LA County Department of Health Services, Housing for Health



Operated by Brilliant Corners



Why a Local Subsidy Pool?

- Not enough federal or state resources
- The problem is complex and requires flexibility
- Difficult to create a full continuum through federal resources and one-time funding
- This enables creation of new care settings

Locally funded housing subsidies & supports are part of the solution

'Flex Pool' Overview

A fiscal and contractual tool that allows County partners and other investors to scale housing options throughout LA County

- Engages landlords to cultivate scattered-site housing
- Partners with PSH developers to develop and sustain project-based sites
- Facilitates Enriched Residential Care placements
- Flexible local rental subsidies + financial assistance to obtain and maintain housing



How the Flex Pool Model Works



Landlord Engagement Creates Portfolio of Units



Tenancy Supports
Team Ensures

Brilliant Corners role also includes: Timely rent payments, housing deposit assistance, and flexible funding for participants

FHSP Partnerships and Funding Streams



- Can use funding sources flexibly.
- Seeded with funding from government and philanthropy
- **Expanded with funding** from other County depts, voterapproved taxes, Medicaid waivers, local health plan grants, state + federal funding



- Over \$220M in braided funding in FY24/25, & help support utilization of federal subsidies
- By pooling resources, FHSP enables LA County to use shorter-term, restrictive funding to create flexible solutions + long-term stability

Replicating the Model



San Francisco

- Launched July 2020
- Operated in partnership with San
 Francisco Department of Homelessness &
 Supportive Housing

San Diego

- Launched October 2020
- Operated in partnership with San Diego
 Regional Task Force on Homelessness

Challenges

- Housing stock and market conditions
- Funding for ongoing solutions
- Data sharing and integration
- Ensuring equity across the board



Opportunities for the Flex Pool



How This Can Work in Your Community



Develop comprehensive program design and structure



Build relationships with your local county, government stakeholders, housing authority



Engage with your local government to see if funds available to cover any gap funding needed to ensure vouchers are used



Centralize the framework for client-related costs
