
Forecasting 2025 Under the Trump Administration

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Trump won both the Electoral College and popular vote, which Republicans view as a clear mandate.





2024 Campaign

Housing supply

- Deport millions of undocumented people
- Extend Opportunity Zones tax incentives
- Reduce regulations that prevent housing development
- Open federal land for housing development



Record as President (2016-2020)

- Suspended and weakened Fair Housing laws
- Proposed deep cuts to housing investments REJECTED
- Proposed higher rents and work requirements for HUD residents REJECTED
- Proposed allowing shelters to turn away homeless transgender UNFINISHED
- Proposed evicting mixed-status immigrant households UNFINISHED
- Proposed weakening Housing First in homelessness programs REJECTED
- Proposed creating government camps for homeless people UNFINISHED



Project 2025

- Weaken fair housing laws
- Deep cuts to housing investments/turn programs into block grants
- Higher rents and work requirements for HUD residents
- Evicting mixed-status immigrant households
- Ending Housing First in homelessness programs
- Replace career staff with political appointees NEW




How Is 2024 Different Than 2016?

- The incoming administration knows how to navigate, and they can implement changes more quickly than in 2016.
- Fewer establishment Republicans are willing to serve in the administration.
- Fewer Republicans in Congress to push back on harmful proposals.
- President-elect Trump says he wants to fire career staff who may stand in the way of his policies.
- The Supreme Court put in place fewer guardrails to prevent unlawful behavior, and opened the door to criminalization of homelessness.
- Shifts in public opinion, especially around homelessness.



Administration

- Deport undocumented immigrants
- Sign EO to eliminate birthright citizenship
- Ramp up oil production and roll back environmental regs
- Reverse Biden policies on DEI, LBGTQ, and civil rights
- Fire DOJ special counsel and pardon January 6 convictions
- Reclassify federal career staff to be "at-will"
- Impose tariffs on foreign-made goods

Agenda for 2025



Congress

- Extend 2017 Trump tax cuts for corporations and the wealthy
- Roll back environmental investments in the Inflation Reduction Act
- Lifting the debt ceiling/negotiating for spending cuts
- Make changes to the Affordable Care Act

Lame Duck



The Biden administration and Congress will need to:

- Pass a final spending bill or Continuing Resolution by December 20
 - House: 3% cut to HUD funding
 - Senate: 10% increase to HUD funding
- Enact disaster recovery funding bill

Lame Duck



Pre-Election Speculation:

 Speaker Johnson opposed to omnibus spending bill → Congress would pass disaster recovery bill, CR lasting to February or March

Post-Election Speculation:

- Republicans may want to start Trump Administration with a "clean slate," finalize FY25 by 2025
- Republican leaders in Congress consulting with incoming administration on strategy

Urge Congress to finalize a FY25 spending bill with significant increases to HUD's programs

Lame Duck



Disaster Recovery Funding Bill

- "\$50-100 billion" for communities impacted by Hurricanes Helene and Milton, continued recovery efforts in Maui, other disaster-impacted areas
- Opportunity to potentially advance the Reforming Disaster Recovery Act

Urge Congress to support the Reforming Disaster Recovery Act

Appropriations



The Trump administration proposed:

- Deep cuts to HUD funding, ranging from 15% to 18.3%
- Eliminating housing vouchers for 160,000-250,000 households
- Zeroing out funding for construction (PH, HTF)
- Eliminating USICH

These proposals were rejected by Congress, but led to a historic 35-day government shutdown

Regardless of who controls the White House, Congress must reach a bicameral agreement on annual spending.

Tax Policy



In 2017, President Trump signed into law a tax bill:

- Cutting taxes for the wealthy and corporations
- Doubling the standard deduction and limit MID
- Weakening demand for LIHTC, leading to a temporary increase of 12.5%
- Establishing Opportunity Zones

Regardless of the outcome of the election, Congress must take up tax issues in 2025. Republicans will use the "budget reconciliation" process to bypass Democrats.

Housing Supply



Focus on zoning, but mixed messages

- Signed EO establishing White Housing Council on Eliminating Barriers to Housing Development
- Decried efforts to increase housing density and reform single-family zoning laws as attempts to "fundamentally change the nature of some communities"
- Trump has called zoning regulations "a killer" of affordable housing construction

The Trump campaign calls for

- Opening federal land for development
- Reducing regulations to encourage more development

Homelessness & Housing First



President Trump undermined solutions to homeless:

- Replaced USICH head with Robert Marbut
- Proposed to shift HUD funding away from HF in homelessness programs
- Proposed to allow shelters to discriminate against transgender unhoused people
- Proposed "camps" for unhoused people to "earn" the right to sleep indoors

The President has broad authority to shift focus within homelessness programs, unless Congress stops them.

Immigration



The Trump administration proposed to evict mixed status immigrant households and discourage access to housing benefits

- Released HUD's Mixed-Status Immigrant Household NPRM would put housing at risk for tens of thousands of households, including 55k children
- Published a final Public Charge rule

Trump calls for the mass deportation of undocumented people.

Tenants' Rights



The Trump administration proposed to:

- Increase rent on HUD households
- Triple minimum rent for "working households" and increase minimum rent for elderly and disabled families
- Proposed allowing HUD to change rent policies without protections for renters
- Proposed allowing work requirements

Many policy changes require Congressional action, though federal agencies have the authority to take action

Fair Housing



The Trump administration

- Suspended and replaced the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing rule
- Undermined the "Disparate Impact" rule
- Failed to bring major enforcement actions/investigations of fair housing violations

The administration has a lot of authority to influence fair housing, while Congress has shown less interest.




