Washington Post Editorial Calls for Improved Targeting of Federal Housing Benefits

Cosponsor The Common Sense Housing Investment Act (H.R. 1662)

Dear Colleague,

I write to draw your attention to the below <u>editorial in yesterday's Washington Post</u> which calls for converting the regressive mortgage interest deduction to a flat rate tax credit and using the savings to invest in affordable rental housing for extremely low-income people.

As the *Post* noted, our nation provides <u>way more generous benefits</u> to the <u>wealthiest homeowners</u> while providing inadequate rental housing assistance to low-income families. In fact, the average family earning more than \$200,000 a year receives four times the federal housing benefits received by the average family who earns under \$20,000 annually.

Meanwhile, our <u>rental housing crisis</u> continues to worsen. Nearly half of all renters pay more than 30% of their income for housing and nearly all extremely low-income households pay more than half. The affordable rental housing shortage primarily affects people under 25, the elderly, people with disabilities and low-income families.

As Congress considers tax reform, we should consider my bill, The Common Sense Housing Investment Act, (H.R. 1662). Supported by more than 2,200 local governments and organizations, the bill converts the mortgage interest deduction to a 15 percent flat-rate tax credit on interest paid on mortgages up to \$500,000. A 15 percent tax credit would actually allow 16 million more homeowners to receive a tax benefit.

I would use the savings to address the national rental housing shortage. My bill would provide for \$200 billion over ten years to expand the Low Income Housing Tax Credit, Section 8 rental assistance and the public housing capital fund. It would also provide permanent funding to build more affordable rental housing through the National Affordable Housing Trust Fund.
