RE: CDBG-DR- EXTENSION OF COMMENT PERIOD AND PUBLIC HEARINGS

Dear Secretaries Carson and Gil Enseñat:

We, as leaders for low and moderate-income communities, advocates, grassroots organizations and access to justice community members in Puerto Rico and the United States, request the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to grant an extension to the public commentary period for the Puerto Rico Draft Plan for the Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) Program, scheduled to be made public on May 9th, 2018. We also request that HUD ensure that public hearings are held as an integral part of the public participation component sufficiently prior to the submission of the Puerto Rico Action Plan to allow thoughtful consideration of the hearing record.

As per the published schedule, the government of Puerto Rico must submit an Action Plan no later than May 10th. This plan must detail their strategy and justifications for the allocation of \$1.5 billion in CDBG-DR funds to aid in the long term recovery from Hurricane Maria. As advocates and community leaders, we are concerned over the lack of effective public participation in the hearings conducted in March and in which several proposals for the allocations were received. Not only was the notice for these hearings inadequate but the participation consisted mainly of municipalities and government agencies. Many of the proposals presented by these public officials include the

displacement of historically vulnerable communities who have been unable to access any information around CDBG-DR processes or the projected plans.

The importance of CDBG-DR funds for long-term recovery, the lack of access to information and the inadequacy of the data that supports the aforementioned proposals make it urgent for these communities to participate, provide alternate data and have the chance to defend their right to adequate housing and democratic participation. Too often, money intended for low and moderate income people's housing has been diverted to uses other than fair housing compliance. We share a responsibility to ensure that available resources are used fairly, efficiently, and effectively, with a level of transparency and accountability that provides the public with confidence on public spending and post-recovery planning.

Taking all of these facts into consideration, we request:

- a. A 30-day extension of the public comment period on the Draft Action Plan. This would provide communities and grassroots organizations with sufficient time to consider the Draft Plan, effectively assess their infrastructure and housing needs and present commentaries on the Draft plan. This may also require a waiver and extension of the evaluation period HUD has to evaluate and approve the Action Plan.
- b. The celebration of public hearings as part of the Draft Plan comment period. These hearings must be evenly distributed through geographical areas and properly notified. Notices in both Spanish and English should be published. Public participation is a requirement for the allocation of these funds and the possibility of new public hearings can provide HUD, the local Department of Housing and other stakeholders with a better perspective of the unmet needs of the communities.
- c. An official translation of the Allocation Notice and other CDBG-DR funds information into Spanish, in order to ensure that information is effectively communicated to inhabitants of Puerto Rico.

All of these requests would lead to a more inclusive and participative process and outcome, where the true unmet needs of underrepresented communities are taken into account. The right to housing is a human right, fundamental to guarantee human dignity and fair conditions of life. Efforts to rebuild Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricanes Irma and Maria require the joint collaboration of different sectors and such cooperation is only possible on the grounds of participation and access to information. The requested comment period extension and the conducting of public hearings would

provide communities and their leaders an active voice and efficient participation in their future. It is in the best interest of our communities and organizations that we announce our disposition to collaborate and facilitate processes leading to promote and ensure such participation.
