# Rapid Unsheltered Survivor Housing Program (RUSH) NLIHC DHRC 11/1/2022



#### Filling the Gap

- The Rapid Unsheltered Survivor Housing (RUSH) program will fill a gap in federal disaster assistance for people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.
- People experiencing pre-disaster homelessness have very limited eligibility for FEMA Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA).







#### **Grounding Our Work in Equity**

Modeled after HUD's Emergency Solutions Grant Program, RUSH funding will be available to States or units of general local governments to support people:

- experiencing homelessness;
- those living in an emergency shelter, transitional housing, or a place not meant for human habitation;
- people at risk homelessness; and
- those who have below 30 percent of area median income and either live in severe overcrowding, face eviction in the next 21 days, or have another risk factor for homelessness.





#### Use of Funds

RUSH provides funding for eligible activities including:

- emergency shelter;
- rapid re-housing, which provides up to 24 months of rental assistance, financial assistance for move in costs, and supportive services for people currently experiencing homelessness;
- homelessness prevention, which provides up to 24 months of rental assistance, utility assistance, and supportive services for people at risk of homelessness; and
- outreach assistance, including assistance to meet urgent needs, for people who are unsheltered.






#### Initial Allocation Formula Description

- o For Localities, the First (Initial) Allocation is the lesser of \$1M or the number of sheltered or unsheltered homelessness (based on Point-in-Time (PIT) count) multiplied by Fair Market Rent for a 1-bedroom apartment where FEMA's TSA is made available.
- Statewide allocations will be capped at \$3M.

 This first allocation in response to Hurricane Ian is providing \$6.8 million to seven local ESG grantees plus a grant to the state of Florida.

#### Second Allocation Formula Description

- The second allocation will come later, as more complete data on the extent of damage— particularly for rental units occupied by very-lowincome households— becomes available.
- The exact methodology for this second allocation is still being developed.





### A Lengthy Process to Access Recovery Funds





#### Current CDBG-DR Issues



- 1. Lengthy process slows down recovery time
- 2. Requirements vary each time
- 3. Funds can be spent disproportionately
- 4. Lack of oversight of grantees
- 5. Capacity Issues for Smaller grantees

## Moving Forward



- Currently
  - Version in the House version of the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA)
  - Version in the Senate Transportation, Housing, and Urban Development (THUD) Appropriation Bill
  - End of Year Packages
- Previously
  - Passed the House in 2019
  - Endorsed by HUD and Government Accountability Office in last two Administrations
  - Survey by Bipartisan Policy Center: 97% of CDBG-DR grantees supported permanent authorization
