- New York's homelessness rate is double the national rate. 158,020 people experienced homelessness in 2024.2
- New York is not producing enough housing. NY increased supply only 5.9% from 2012 to 2022, ranking 32 nationally in production. During this period of low supply growth, monthly costs grew rapidly for renters (39%) and homeowners (28%).3

## **Messaging On Housing Market Impact**

### **Climate of Uncertainty**

- Funding disruptions and staff reductions delaying current affordable projects
- Deep staffing cuts at FHA in particular could cause instability across the entire housing finance market
- Lenders, owners and developers spooked and will view affordable deals as increasingly more risky

### **Voters Want Action on Housing**

 Republicans swept the 2024 election due to voter frustration on cost inflation, housing is inflations biggest driver. So far policies are hurting housing not helping.

### **State of Play**

- Congress is almost five months behind schedule in passing an FY25 budget for HUD
- Federal government operating on a CR until Friday (March 14)

House Republicans released on Saturday proposal for a CR that would last through September

 Flat fund federal programs, including HUD, plus additional funding for key programs



### **Details of the CR**

- **Topline:** The bill would cut \$13 billion in domestic spending from the previous fiscal year, while also proposing funding adjustments for some federal programs, including an additional \$6 billion in defense spending and additional spending for some key HUD programs:
  - \$32.14 billion to renew contracts under HUD's Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program, a \$3.65 billion increase from the previous fiscal year.
  - This increase would likely not be sufficient to cover the needed cost of voucher renewals, and would result in an <u>estimated loss of 32,000 vouchers</u> from the program if enacted.



## **Details of the CR**

- \$16.49 billion for HUD's Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA) program, a \$480 million increase from FY24.
- **\$931.4 million for Section 202**, an \$18 million increase from the last fiscal year. Section 202 provides affordable, accessible housing and supportive services for older adults.
- **\$256.7 million for Section 811**, an increase of \$48.7 million from the previous fiscal year. Section 811 provides affordable, accessible housing and supportive services to help people with disabilities live in communities, rather than institutionalized settings.



### **Details of the CR**

- Homeless Assistance Grants: CR gives the HUD Secretary the authority to "repurpose funds made available" for the <u>Continuum of Care (CoC) Builds</u> program to instead fund CoC renewals.
  - A Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the CoCBuilds program was released last year, but the funds were never awarded.
  - This maneuver is expected to shortfall HUD's homeless assistance programs by an estimated \$168 million, and impact housing services for about 20,000 people
- **\$3.43 billion for HUD's Community Development Fund**, a \$3.29 billion cut from the previous fiscal year.
  - Most of the funding lost in the proposal would be the result of lost "earmarks," or congressionally requested funding for community development projects, some of which would fund programs that provide shelter and other lifesaving services to people at risk of or experiencing homelessness.
- The bill would not provide additional spending for disaster recovery, nor would it address the looming early summer deadline to raise the federal debt ceiling and avoid a potentially catastrophic default on the national debt.



### What happens next?

House vote on CR expected today – with no support from Democrats, Speaker Johnson can only lose one Republican vote

 If the bill passes, it faces a steeper hurdle in the Senate – need support from 7 Democrats to pass, if every Republican votes in-favor

### Meanwhile...

Democratic Appropriations leaders DeLauro (D-CT) and Murray (D-WA) released the text of another short-term CR to extend federal funding until April 11
